Greetings, dear Church Family,

Lordy, Lordy, we head into October of 2021, with beautiful Fall colors and mornings with clear blue skies and brisk temperatures. More of us are out and about, still masked but many vaccinated, compared to this same time last year. Small and glorious blessings! Still, we are watching numbers to see just how far out we might venture while determining need and urgency. Still seeking the best ways to keep one another safe and healthy; still wishing one another greetings yet expressing our care in that regard. Thank you all for your continued care and wisdom for everyone's continued safety. It is a profound statement of faith: we care for one another in the best ways we know. Simple.

Still, there is so much that is uncertain, sometimes month-to-month, week-to-week, day-to-day; sometimes even hour-to-hour. We think we have one understanding, and then a new report comes in, or new numbers are released and, lo, we are scuttling about to consider the new information for what we had considered, only moments before, to be our best laid plans. What a time this has been; never ending. How long, O Lord!

From the perspective of Christian faith communities, across the history of The Church, we faithful folks are often known for talking about The Seven Last Words of Christ. Often "The Seven Last Words" are not always exactly 'seven last words' but seven sentiments that include the 'Seven Sayings': 'for they know not what they do'; 'you will be with me in paradise'; 'Woman! Behold, your son!'; 'My God, why have you forsaken me?'; 'I thirst...'; 'It is finished....'; and, finally, 'into thy hands I commend my spirit.' We recognize the consistent theme of 'surrender' in each of the sayings. We are called 'to surrender' to what God puts before us, to surrender to God's will; remember? 'Thy will be done.' Not always easy; not always pleasant and almost never welcome. Embedded in all the dimensions of 'surrender' is the bright beacon of hope that God offers those of us who hold on to our faith, embracing the trust in God's will. But, alas, The Bible is replete with stories of 'willful', well-meaning people, who object to 'surrender' and want their own way. We, too, are among them; bless us all, dear God!

Over time, many folks 'in the church' have become familiar with the affectionate, humorous statement referring to 'The Seven Last Words of the Church.' Almost all of us folks of faith are encountering these 'seven last words of the church', these days, in the forefront of our general, regular operational conversations. The Church's Seven Last Words are: "We've Never Done It That Way Before!" Historically, these words have been a cheeky way of defending and lifting up our love for the 'good ole tried and true' and 'successful' choices, our lofty regard for the familiar



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and for our own beloved precious traditions and life ways. Our life ways are our own personal scientific experiment: under these conditions, if I do this, then this will be the outcome. Predictable behavior, without variables, equals predictable outcome. But, lest we forget: God is our God of surprises. And of course, we know adhering to our own beloved life ways, that includes resisting change, can be antithetical to how God asks us to be faithful, and how God asks us often to 'surrender' to what is unknown, uncomfortable, and unpredictable.

Enter Covid times. Unknown, uncomfortable, unpredictable; upsetting our 'normal ways' of operation and being. Challenging, to put it kindly. Irritating and deeply aggravating, to put it honestly.

We have never before walked these paths. There is so much that is new and beyond our understanding and experience! We attempt to assign our own hard-earned wisdom and experience to interpret the challenge of what we have never seen before: a pandemic we are experiencing in small order in our little corner of the earth. We have found ways to celebrate safely our life passages, e.g. weddings and end of life gatherings, as well as more familiar regular activities of worship, and fellowship – as we adjust our ways, tried and true, appreciated, and expected. But what about the ways we've come to know and love that are no longer safe or appropriate? We long for those ways to resurface! For many, all this 'adjusting' seems cumbersome and contrived. Frustrating, Irritating, a nuisance. When will this be over? It's easy to wonder: why aren't these words included in the last sayings of Christ?

Churches in our lifetime, have never welcomed a new pastor in the heat of a global epidemic; pastors have never arrived at a new pastorate at such a time. We are all learning how to get to know one another in ways we have never experienced. We know, also, that we are a people of generosity and forgiveness. Our better angels can lead us through these troubling times. We can be assured we will be clumsy and awkward as we go; but, also, we are a people of God's love, patience and kindness. We are all finding new ways to carry out tried and true duties for the ardently faithful, the committed skeptics, and the questioning cynics; God be with us in days ahead, if we but turn to acknowledge God's presence, surrendering to 'thy will be done.'. Remind us to surrender to your holy work, O God, your guidance to love and care for one another. Every minute, every hour, every day, - all the time; nudge us all in your way, O God.

Dear Holy God, you have given us the Holy Work to learn how to surrender our strong wills to you as we gather together to do your work and offer your love, care, and kindness through a new lens, with new perspectives. May our faith provide the strength to welcome your nudgings. Be with us as we surrender to your tried and true ways of patience and understanding. It leads us all to your blessing. We ask this remembering the steps of your son when he was wondering, 'when will all of this be over?' Amen.

Fall is here and not disappointing. The colors in the area are starting to "pop" out reminding us that it is one more reason why we love it here.

I wish I could be as "cheery" about the Covid-19 numbers in our state and Franklin County. RCC's Executive Committee (Minister, Head Deacons, Moderator) met and reviewed the data again. I actually follow it almost daily and do my own calculations using the formulas used by the referenced sites, just so I am current with the information. Most sites have a one to two day lag in the data assessment. We follow a number of data reporting sites: The Maine CDC, Fed CDC, NY Times and CovidActNow. The later site, CovidAct Now for Franklin County is the easiest to read and you don't have to do your own calculations plus their data for daily cases, Infection Rate and Positivity percentage is easily found.

All four sites regularly report and their numbers are usually very close to each other. When we returned in person on June 13 Franklin County was averaging 2 cases/day(6.7average cases per day for seven days per 100K population) (which put the Community Infection Risk Level at "Mid-Moderate". For the last 7 day average (9/22-9/28 MeCDC data) it has been 15.1 cases (50.4 average cases per day for seven days per 100K population /day) which is in the "High" risk level. We are still at high levels for daily cases, infection rate and positivity. It had been improving but the numbers significantly bumped up early this week. We are still over the 10 average cases per day per 100K population needed to put us in the Level 2 or Moderate risk levels.

The plan is that when we reach a Level 2 or Moderate 7 day average for 100K population and the Infection rate is close to 0.8 and Positivity Rate is close to 3% those will be indicators suggesting we can be back in person.

It's not easy or fun making these decisions but rather than making the decision based upon "gut feeling" we want to fall back on the science and the data.

It is important that we not go from week to week in deciding about in person or zoom only. Those involved with the services need lead time to plan. So for the month of October the plan is that we will be Zooming our Services for October 3,10,17. In person services will be assessed as time moves on.

The credit for our continued Zoom Services goes to the talent and flexibility of Rev Leslie, Sue, Sam and his crew and the Deacons. Thank you so much.

So please hang in there. Be safe.

Youth and Young Adult Ministers wondered how to effectively reach out during the pandemic and sought peers' support.

In part supported by Strengthen the Church funds, the Rev. Trayce Potter organized a "Reset for Renewal" event for people working with youth and young adults.
