### **Finance Committee**

# Paula Hatfield

The Finance Committee has met monthly via Zoom to review and discuss financial activity and reports. This year in-depth analysis is being done on a quarterly basis in light of the projected budget deficit. The mid-year analysis of activity through December 31, 2021 was shared with the Council at the January meeting.

Our YTD Pledged Contributions include multiple prepaid pledges, both 100% paid and partial prepays. This requires that we subtract the amount of prepaid pledged contributions that are intended to be applied towards our remaining annual expenses to get an accurate picture of our income YTD. The adjusted balance equals YTD Pledged Contributions of \$54,835 less annualized prepaid pledge amount of \$17,261 resulting in an adjusted YTD Pledged Contributions of \$37,574.

Summary of as of December 31, 2021

YTD Total Income	\$64,833.76
Less prepaid pledges	\$17,261.00
Adjusted YTD Total Income	\$47,572.76
Less YTD Total Expenses	\$55,710.00
Difference as of $9/30/21$	\$-8,137.24



Note that this is less than our budgeted YTD deficit of

\$12,456. This is due in large part to heating, plowing and sanding expenses that occur between October to May but are budgeted equally over 12 months. It is also due to substantial savings we experience during remote worship including utilities, heating and cleaning expenses. Another quarterly analysis will be done at the end of March which will be used for budgeting purposes.

During our continued time of remote worship, we greatly appreciate your continued financial support. Please mail all contributions to Rangeley Congregational Church, PO Box 218, Rangeley, ME 04970. #### Rangeley Congregational Church Women's Fellowship Donates \$7,000 to Charity

This past year Rangeley Congregational Church Women's Fellowship group was able to participate in two summer festivals in Rangeley, where handmade crafts, jams, and baked goods were sold. All the proceeds of these fairs are donated to charity. Due to the increasing Covid-19 numbers in Maine, the annual Holly Fair was postponed.
