Such is life in rural Maine while trying to meet the most basic requirements: two or three extra hours of driving just to get what is necessary. So it goes. Oh my. I love where I live and I can't wait to get home and start recuperating in this place I so dearly love around the people whom I love and who love me. Love is a grand Healer!

I will do the same for all of you. I'll have lots of time and the quiet and reasonably solitary setting to pray for all of you; and I assure you, I will. Being confined is a great time to pray for all whom you wish to pray; our friends and neighbors in the Ukraine will be receiving my prayers, too. I will come out of hibernation as I begin to feel lighter, more energetic with some spring in my step.

The oncologist recommended I slow things down to snail mail for now until we have a better perspective on what is ahead; she is ardent about me not working in the next bit ahead and resting to rebuild well and quickly. She is pleased to say I am in great health, and strong, and will likely recover very well. Please God be with us all.

We will return to texts and email, assuredly.
